## Executive Summary

The CURTAIN project aims to **reduce cancer-related inequalities** across Europe by **strengthening cancer literacy**, that is the ability of individuals, organisations and communities to access, understand and use health information to make informed decisions about themselves or other family and community members.

CURTAIN leverages **innovative digital tools**, including AI-based solutions, to empower citizens and supports health systems in delivering fairer, more effective cancer prevention and support for all. CURTAIN is one of five projects funded under the EU4Health Cancer Health Literacy Call (EU4H-2024-PJ-02-2), alongside CHOICE, INTERVENE, BCLEAR and CLEAR-PC. Together these projects form a portfolio of complementary efforts to advance cancer literacy across Europe.

Within this context, Deliverable D6.1 **Virtual Cancer Literacy Library** presents the structured prototype of a digital knowledge hub that will consolidate and curate cancer literacy resources developed and identified throughout the CURTAIN project. Submitted in response to Milestone MS18 (Month 9, WP6), this document describes the architecture, navigation structure, governance framework and multilingual design of the Library, and evidences the intermediate tool foreseen in the project work plan. The Virtual Cancer Literacy Library is conceived as a central access point bringing together tools, guidance, training materials, co-created content and policy-relevant outputs for diverse audiences across seven countries and six languages.

The Virtual Cancer Literacy Library serves both a practical and strategic function. As a practical tool, it enables users to access and reuse cancer literacy resources according to their needs, roles and contexts, including citizens and patients, healthcare professionals, civil society organisations, policy makers and other stakeholders. As a strategic asset, it supports coherence across CURTAIN work packages by providing a shared infrastructure through which project outputs are disseminated and contextualised.

By establishing a common, user-friendly knowledge infrastructure at this early stage of the project, this deliverable supports coherent knowledge exchange and uptake of CURTAIN results throughout the project lifecycle and beyond. The prototype provides the foundation for content population from WP3, WP4, WP5 and WP6 activities as they are completed, helping to reduce fragmentation of cancer literacy resources and supporting the long-term sustainability and impact of the CURTAIN project. The fully populated Library, constituting the final version of D6.1, will be delivered at Month 34.



## Objective and scope

The present report D6.1 Virtual Cancer Literacy Library describes the structured prototype of the **Virtual Cancer Literacy Library**, a digital knowledge infrastructure that will systematically consolidate, curate and make accessible the cancer literacy resources developed and identified across the CURTAIN project. Submitted in response to Milestone MS18 (Month 9, WP6), this document defines the architecture, governance, multilingual design and content population pathway of the Library, constituting the intermediate tool foreseen in the project work plan.

The purpose of this deliverable is to establish the structured prototype of the Virtual Cancer Literacy Library and to demonstrate its readiness as the intermediate tool foreseen for Milestone MS18, in support of CURTAIN's mission to reduce cancer-related inequalities across Europe by strengthening cancer literacy, the ability of individuals, organisations and communities to access, understand and use health information to make informed decisions. When fully populated, the Library will bring together diverse project outputs within a coherent digital environment, enabling structured access to tools, guidelines, training materials, co-created content and policy-relevant resources across six languages and seven countries, supporting evidence-informed action, cross-sector learning and effective dissemination.

The Virtual Cancer Literacy Library is intended to serve as both a practical access point and a strategic enabler. It facilitates reuse and adaptation of cancer literacy resources across different contexts, strengthens coherence between CURTAIN work packages and enhances the visibility and uptake of project results among internal and external stakeholders.

Its intended audience includes citizens and patients, healthcare professionals, civil society organisations and advocacy groups, policy makers and public health practitioners, academic researchers and evaluators, as well as other stakeholders interested in advancing cancer literacy in Europe.

The main recommendations associated with this milestone are that all consortium partners submit validated outputs to the Library in line with agreed timelines and the governance framework set out in this document; that the Library is used as the central platform for dissemination and engagement activities under WP7; and that the sustainability arrangements led by SHINE 2Europe and the Global Health Connector<sup>1</sup> are activated ahead of project completion to ensure continuity beyond Month 36. doing so, CURTAIN will contribute to a more connected and equitable cancer literacy ecosystem across Europe.

## Relation to other WPs and deliverables

The present deliverable is linked with:

- **WP1 – Project Management, Monitoring, Evaluation and Coordination**, which provides the governance and quality framework underpinning the Library.
- **WP2 – Mapping Cancer Literacy Resources, Stakeholders, Initiatives and relevant KPIs**, whose outputs, including the Interactive Stakeholder Map (D2.4), are represented within the Library architecture.
- **WP3 – Design of the Cancer Literacy Tools and Interventions**, contributing digital tools, cancer literacy scores and guidelines on the appropriate use of LLMs (D3.3).
- **WP4 – Cancer Literacy among Citizens and Patients**, providing co-created content and real-life use frameworks for cancer literacy (D4.3, D4.4).
- **WP5 – Cancer Literacy Education of Health Care Professionals and Relevant Stakeholders**, contributing training programmes, digital tools and organisational cancer literacy outputs.
- **WP6 – Developing a Virtual Cancer Literacy Library and Policy Guidelines for Cancer Literacy**, under which this deliverable is produced.
- **WP7 – Raising Awareness and Ensuring Sustainable Communication in Cancer Literacy**, supporting dissemination, engagement and **sustainability** of the Library.



## Content of the Virtual Library

The Virtual Cancer Literacy Library is a core digital deliverable of the CURTAIN project. It functions as a structured knowledge hub designed to consolidate and curate cancer literacy resources produced and identified across all project work packages, in support of CURTAIN's overarching mission to reduce cancer-related inequalities across Europe. Cancer literacy is influenced by health systems, education, digital environments, policy frameworks and social contexts, and the Library provides a coherent environment that brings these dimensions together for users with diverse needs and roles.

The Virtual Cancer Literacy Library is distinct from the project website's dedicated public deliverables section, where formal project deliverables and milestones are published. The Library is designed to host user-friendly, accessible outputs (summaries, tools, infographics, training materials and co-created content) rather than full technical deliverables, which will continue to be uploaded to the existing deliverables page on the project website. It is conceived not as a static archive but as an enabling infrastructure that facilitates collaboration, policy translation and long-term learning across the seven consortium countries and beyond.

### Concept and Design Principles

The concept of the Virtual Cancer Literacy Library is grounded in clarity, trust and usability. The design prioritises immediate user orientation, ensuring that visitors can quickly identify the purpose of the Library, the types of resources it contains and how these relate to their roles and needs. Five audience-based entry points, aligned with CURTAIN's five thematic pillars (Pillar A: Cancer Literacy among Citizens; Pillar B: Cancer Literacy among Patients; Pillar C: Cancer Literacy among Healthcare Professionals; Pillar D: Organisational Cancer Literacy; and Pillar E: Digital Tools and Addressing Knowledge Gaps and Inequalities), guide users towards relevant content without requiring prior knowledge of the project structure.

The Library follows a modular and consistent visual architecture. Resources are organised into clearly defined thematic sections aligned with CURTAIN outputs, while standardised presentation ensures transparency regarding source, scope, version and intended audience. Accessibility and usability are integral to the design, with navigation, filtering and search functionalities supporting efficient access for both



technical and non-technical audiences. Interactive tools, including the Stakeholder Interactive Map, are integrated within the same environment.

## Prototype Architecture and Current Status

At the time of submission of this deliverable, the Virtual Cancer Literacy Library exists as a structured visual prototype. The prototype presents the full navigational framework, metadata architecture and five-pillar organisation that will govern content population throughout the remainder of the project. It constitutes the intermediate tool foreseen for Milestone MS18 (Month 9, WP6), providing a reviewable and shareable visual architecture as the foundation for subsequent content submission by all consortium partners. The prototype is added to this deliverable and submitted alongside it as evidence of the intermediate tool.

Each resource submitted to the Library is associated with a standardised set of metadata:

- content type (tool, guideline, training material, best practice, policy resource or co-created content); target audience;
- the relevant CURTAIN work package and deliverable reference;
- the country or countries of applicability;
- and the languages in which it is available.

This tagging system enables users to filter and search by role, language and thematic area, supporting both exploratory browsing and targeted retrieval.

The prototype illustrates how the first completed project output, the CURTAIN Interactive Stakeholders Map (D2.4) will be integrated and presented within the Library environment. The Map serves as a concrete reference point for the interactive tool integration model that will be applied to subsequent CURTAIN outputs. As outputs from WP3, WP4, WP5 and WP6 are finalised throughout 2026 and 2027, they will be submitted to the Library in accordance with the governance framework set out below. The fully populated Library will constitute Deliverable D6.1 at Month 34.

## Navigation Structure: the Five Pillars

The Library is structured around the five thematic pillars that define the CURTAIN project's specific objectives. These pillars provide the primary navigation logic and



map directly onto the content areas and deliverables described in the CURTAIN work plan.

**Pillar A: Cancer Literacy among Citizens.** This section hosts resources supporting public awareness and understanding of cancer prevention, screening and early detection. It will include the Cancer Literacy Score (CLS) and its country-adapted versions, citizen-facing infographics (D4.1), and the policy brief with recommendations for policy action on cancer literacy (D6.2, WP6). Content is designed with particular attention to vulnerable groups including rural populations, older adults, migrants and Roma communities across the seven consortium countries (Bulgaria, Italy, Moldova, Montenegro, Portugal, Romania and Ukraine).

**Pillar B: Cancer Literacy among Patients.** This section consolidates co-created resources supporting patients in understanding their diagnosis, navigating healthcare systems and engaging with treatment decisions. It will include co-created brochures, digital content, workshop materials and the real-life use framework for large language models developed with patients in Bulgaria, Moldova, Montenegro and Romania (D4.3, D4.4).

**Pillar C: Cancer Literacy among Healthcare Professionals.** This section provides access to the Flagship European Cancer Health Literacy Training Programme, including curricula, course materials and evaluation instruments, as well as the CME-O accredited online course hosted on the BJCN digital platform. It is intended for family doctors, oncologists, pharmacists, nurses, medical students and Cancer Literacy Ambassadors across the seven consortium countries (D3.1, D3.2, D5.1, D5.2).

**Pillar D: Organisational Cancer Literacy.** This section hosts the CURTAIN Interactive Stakeholders Map (D2.4), which is already live and embedded in the Library prototype, alongside the organisational cancer literacy assessment framework and country-level outputs from Task T5.5 activities in the consortium countries (D5.3, due M34). Languages for T5.5 and D5.3 outputs are pending confirmation from partners and will be specified once detailed work plans are finalised. It supports healthcare organisations, civil society bodies and policymakers in understanding and improving their organisational health literacy maturity.

**Pillar E: Digital Tools and Addressing Knowledge Gaps & Inequalities.** This section brings together the guidelines on the appropriate use of large language models for cancer literacy (D3.3), which will be presented in the Library as audience-specific sections targeting patients and citizens, healthcare professionals, and clinical institutions respectively, with the full consolidated guideline also accessible in its



entirety. It also includes a synthesis of key findings and recommendations from the cancer disinformation and misinformation mapping report (D2.2), presented as an accessible infographic or summary rather than the full technical report. Cancer literacy guidelines addressing misinformation and disinformation, expected as a project output by the end of the project, will also be integrated. Digital resources for health journalists on how to write and publish responsibly about cancer, how to encourage healthy lifestyles and how to engage with medical evidence (Task T7.5) will be included. Informative sheets and infographics based on the findings of the best practices compendium (D2.1), mapping of cancer literacy resources (D2.3) and KPI monitoring outputs (D2.5) will also be integrated into this section.

In addition to these five pillars, a cross-cutting Best Practices section consolidates good practices in cancer literacy identified across the consortium countries. This section is accessible from each pillar entry point and supports knowledge exchange and contextual adaptation across different national settings. It is conceived as a continuously updated resource, organised into two streams: internal practices drawn from CURTAIN's own work across WP2 to WP7, and external practices sourced from other ongoing projects and initiatives related to cancer literacy and cancer more broadly. Each practice is tagged according to the pillar or pillars it addresses, enabling users to filter by thematic area. Practices are not assigned a fixed deadline nor a minimum or maximum number of entries, reflecting the open and evolving nature of this section throughout the project lifecycle and beyond. External practices will be collected through a dedicated submission form on the CURTAIN project website, with consortium representatives selecting and validating entries before publication. The coordination and centralisation process for internal practices will be developed by the consortium and communicated to partners in due course.

A dedicated Cancer Literacy Day tab constitutes a further cross-cutting section of the Library, sitting alongside Best Practices and the Interactive Stakeholders Map in the top-level navigation. It serves as a permanent, audience-segmented hub for Cancer Literacy Day campaign resources, conceived as a recurring annual event beyond the project period. The tab is structured by audience group (resources for citizens, patients, healthcare professionals and organisations) with all materials tagged by language and country. Cancer Literacy Day materials developed under Task T7.3 (due M15 and M27) will be the primary content, and the tab is designed to be updated each year as new campaign materials are produced.

## Multilingual Access

The Library is designed to be accessible in six languages across seven countries, in line with the target set in the CURTAIN project's short-term impact indicators (Section 3.1 of the proposal): Bulgarian, Italian, Montenegrin, Portuguese, Romanian and Ukrainian. Navigation, interface labels and descriptive metadata are available in all six languages. Individual resources are tagged with the languages in which they are available, and country-specific content is clearly flagged and retrievable through a country filter. Resources available only in English are labelled accordingly.

The CURTAIN Interactive Stakeholders Map (D2.4) is currently available in English only. The language coverage of outputs from T5.5 and D5.3 is pending confirmation and will be updated once partner work plans are finalised.

Translation and localisation of Library content is carried out by national partners in each consortium country. As project outputs are produced in national languages through WP4 and WP5, they are submitted to the Library alongside any available translated versions, in line with the submission timeline set out in the governance framework below.

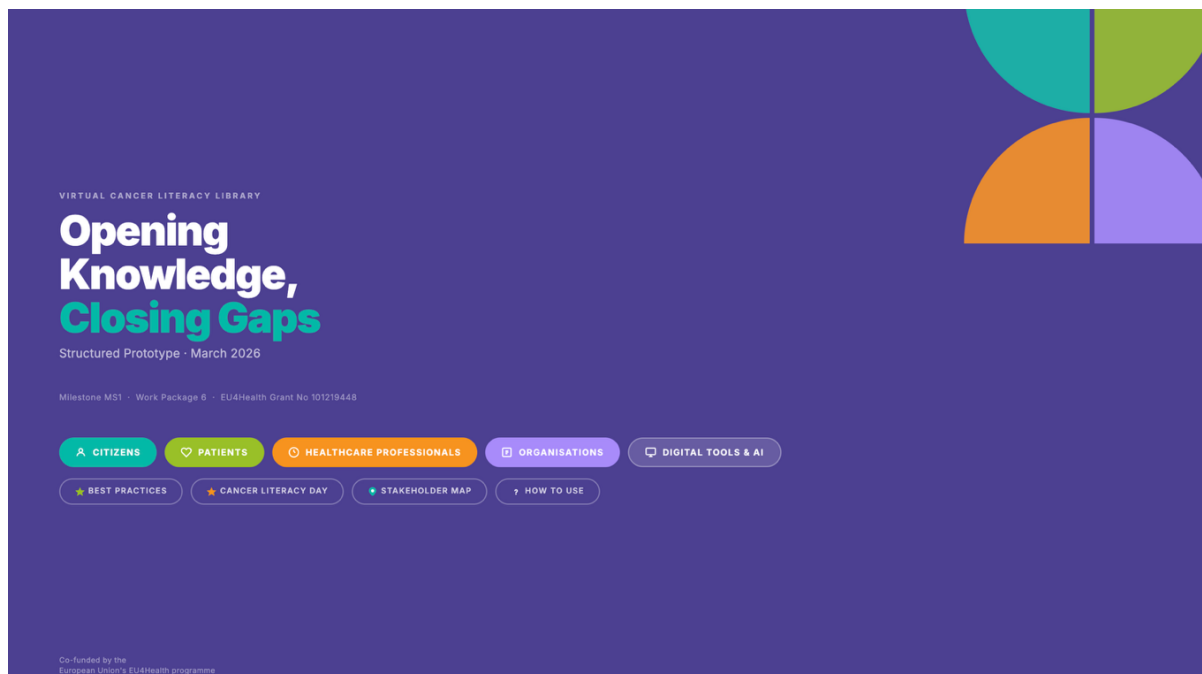


Figure 1. Landing page mock-up

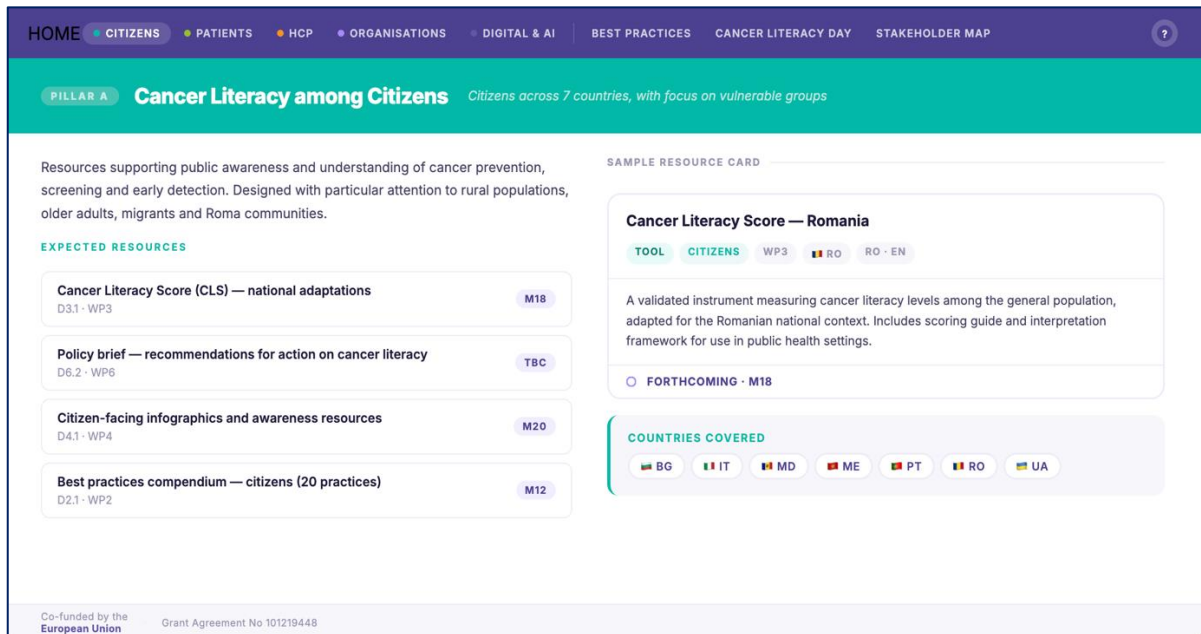


Figure 2. Citizens resources mock-up

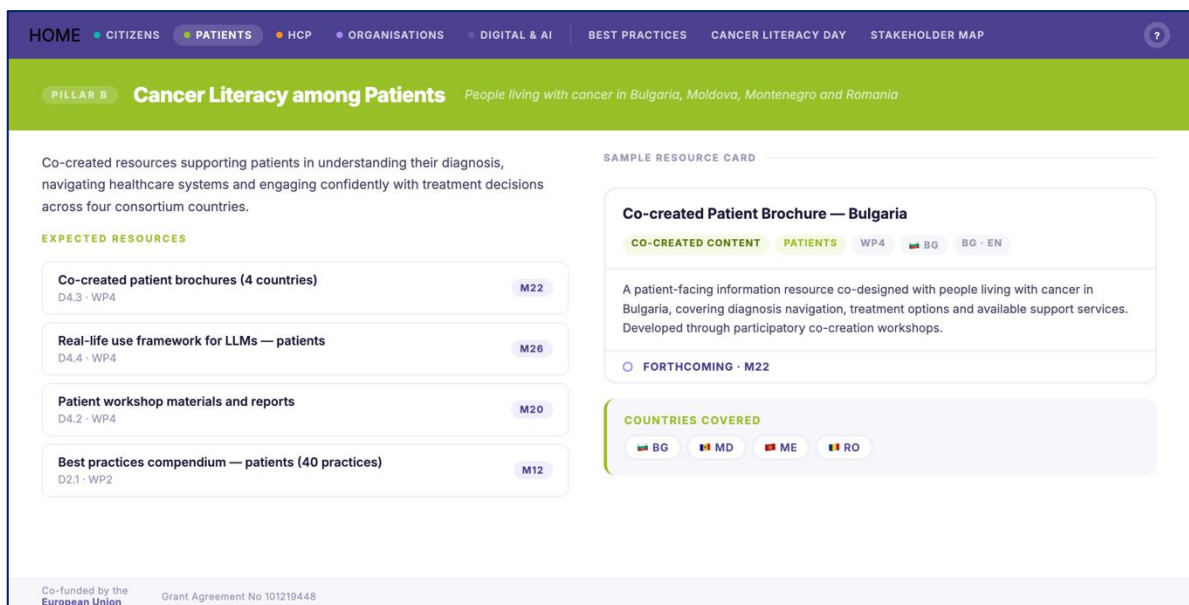



Figure 3. Patients resources mock-up



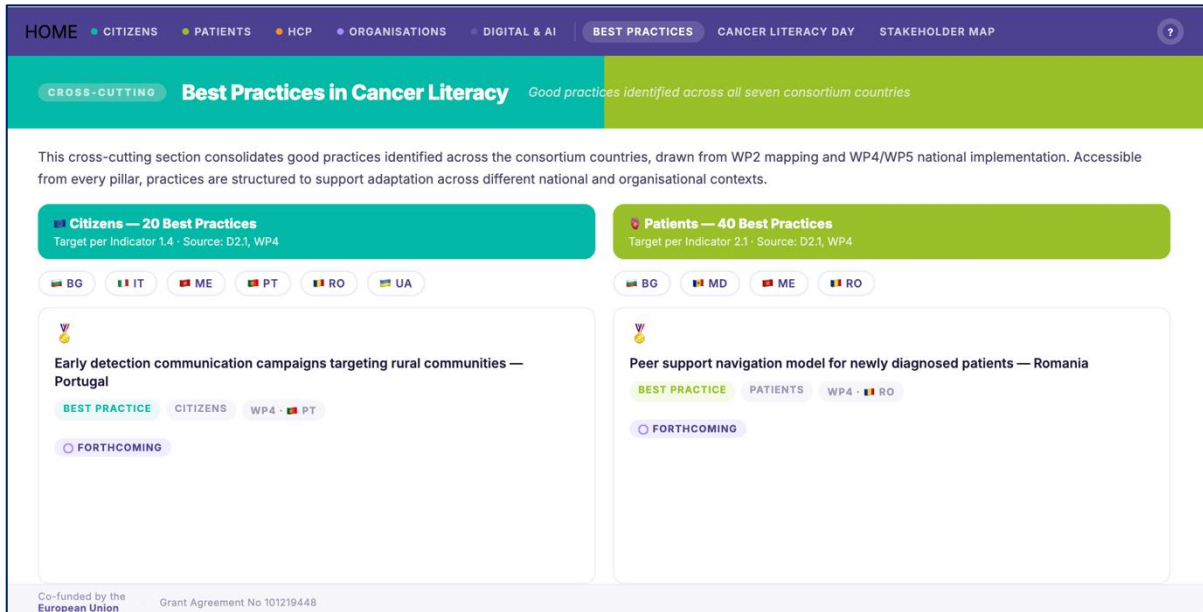


Figure 7. Best Practices resources mock-up

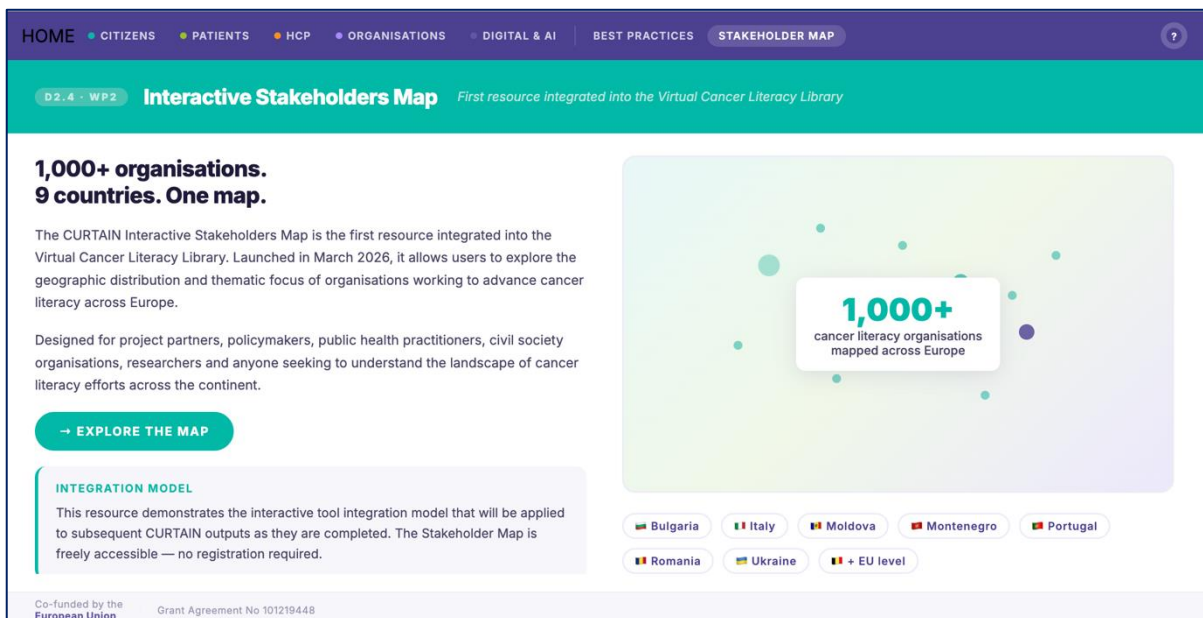


Figure 8. Interactive stakeholders map mock-up

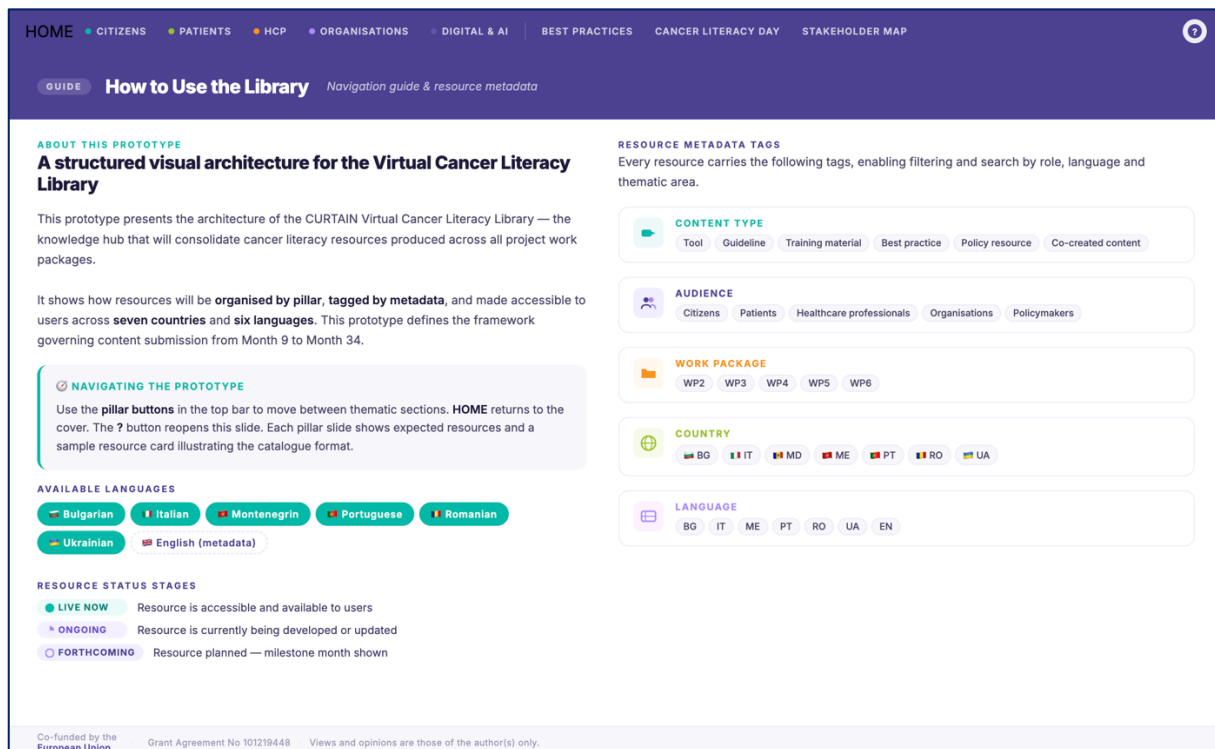


Figure 9. How to use the library mock-up

## Quality Assurance, Governance and Sustainability

Ensuring accessibility, quality and trustworthiness is central to the Library. Content is curated according to clear quality principles, including transparency of sources, relevance to cancer literacy objectives, clarity of intended use and versioning information. Editorial oversight rests with each Leader for the deliverable’s Work Package and All.Can International as lead partner of WP6, with responsibility for curation standards, quality review of submitted resources, version control and structural updates throughout the project lifecycle.

Each consortium partner is responsible for submitting outputs from their respective work package contributions in line with agreed timelines and formatting requirements. To ensure usability and relevance, the Library architecture and proposed content have been reviewed by all consortium partners, who have been invited to confirm resource lists, language coverage and delivery timelines for their respective work packages. Feedback received during this initial co-creation phase has been incorporated into the present version of the deliverable. External validation, including through the National Cancer Literacy Boards in each consortium country, will inform subsequent iterations ahead of the fully populated version at Month 34. INOMED, as project coordinator,



provides overall quality assurance and ensures alignment with the project's ethical and data protection framework (Task T1.3). The National Cancer Literacy Boards in each consortium country act as advisory bodies for country-specific content. A periodic review cycle is built into the governance framework, with content reviewed at each consortium meeting (August 2026, August 2027 and May 2028). Resource titles used in the current prototype are working titles intended for internal orientation. Before publication, all titles will be reviewed for user-facing accessibility and clarity, with partners who prepare and submit content to the Library invited to propose accessible, audience-appropriate titles for their respective resources.

The Virtual Library is conceived as a long-term asset extending beyond the funded project duration. The Global Health Connector leads communication and dissemination under WP7, driving engagement with the Library through social media, webinars and the Cancer Literacy Day events. BJCN's CME-O platform serves as an additional long-term hosting environment for training materials. SHINE 2Europe and Global Health Connector jointly lead post-project sustainability through the Community of Practice established under Task T7.5, and the Virtual Library Sustainability Plan (D7.3) sets out the detailed approach for maintaining the Library's visibility, relevance and usability after project completion. In this way, the Library contributes to a more connected, informed and equitable cancer literacy ecosystem across Europe.
